Voter registration deadline is July 5 for August primary

The deadline to register to vote or change an address and/or name for the Aug. 2, 2022 Primary Election is Tuesday, July 5. The Board of Elections office will be open that evening until 9 pm and is located at 1495 W. Longview Ave., Suite 101 in the Longview Center. After 4 pm visitors must use the entrance at the lower level back parking area at the southwest corner of the building.

Qualifications for registering to vote include:

- must be either a native U. S. citizen, or a naturalized citizen of the U.S.

- must be a resident of Richland County and Ohio 30 days prior to an election

- must be a minimum of 18 years of age on or before the date of the General Election on Nov. 8, 2022.

Registered voters who have moved or changed their name must notify the board office in writing or in person. Voters who are currently registered in Ohio may change their address online at VoteOhio.gov but must do it by the July 5 deadline. Online registration is also now available at VoteOhio.gov

In addition to the Board of Elections office, citizens may register or complete a change of address/name at the following locations in Richland County:

- Any library branch
- All city and village hall offices
- The Bureau of Motor Vehicles office
- The Department of Human Services
- The Richland County Courthouse (Recorder or Treasurer Offices)
- All area high school offices

Registration forms may also be obtained from the Board of Elections’ website at www.boe.ohio.gov/richland or requested by mail. Contact the board office at 419-774-5530 to have a form sent by mail. Completed voter registration forms must be postmarked 30 days prior to Election Day.

Richland County Foundation gives \$2,277,575 worth of grants

The Richland County Foundation Board of Trustees approved \$2,277,575 in grants to nonprofit organizations during its June meeting.

Projects at area nonprofit organizations that received grants from a combination of unrestricted, donor-advised and field of interest funds include:

- A new security camera system for Mansfield Memorial Homes. The system will enhance existing security measures which include other cameras and guards patrolling the campus.

- The Ohio State University at Mansfield will fully implement its Bachelor of Science in Engineering Technology degree to meet emerging workforce needs for mechanical, electrical, industrial and robotics engineers. The grant will support the creation of a Connected Smart Manufacturing Lab at OSU-Mansfield.

- Richland Community Development Group received a grant for advertising and marketing of the newly created Richland County brand.

- Raemelon Therapeutic Equestrian Center received a grant for equine-based therapy scholarships.

- Richland County Soil and Water Conservation District received a grant to help farmers implement nutrient management plans. The plans are an integral part of the H2Ohio program which seeks to limit the amount of fertilizer and livestock waste in rivers and lakes.

- Richland Public Health received a grant for a Pediatric AED Equipment and Education program. Automated external defibrillators (AED machines) will be placed in Richland County schools and

Epidemic hit Sandusky in 1849

Sandusky was always viewed as a busy port and business center. Two railroads and hundreds of ships docked there. It was one of the commerce centers of northern Ohio.

Passenger and freight increased every year until the summer of 1849. Suddenly all that ground to a virtual halt.

A cholera epidemic hit in late June and lasted thru July and August. It was estimated that over 400 people died that summer. An accurate figure may never be known.

The town, with a population of 5,000, saw half (some believe closer to 2/3) of the population flee to other areas. Many were not welcome and, in some cases, were turned away. Some never returned, some became orphans and businesses ground to a halt. The situation struck fear beyond imagination.

The editor of the *Daily Sanduskian* commented, "This shutting up and flying has a bad effect at home and must be disastrous abroad. It creates unnecessary panic among those we leave, and we should think the deserters would be unwelcome visitors where they go."

"At the onset the city had seven doctors. Two died, two left town and the remaining three were worked to exhaustion. Help came when two doctors arrived from Cleveland and later two more from Mansfield. It was difficult to find laborers to dig graves and on the weekend of July 28 and 29, seventy people were buried. Earlier in the week fifty more had been buried. Most were buried in mass graves in what became known as the "Cholera Cemetery."

The newspapers published quack cures, from burning sulfur to exploding gunpowder in the streets to purify the air. One cure, due to a misprint, was down right poison. Sandusky was in an unbelievable panic. Freight ground to a halt on the SM&N railroad and what passengers were arriving, went straight on board of boats who departed as quickly as possible.

But the sought after end of the epidemic is found in the Aug. 20, 1849, issue of the Sandusky paper, "We again hear the sound of the caulker's hammer and the sailors cheerful voice, as they re-rig the vessels laid up during the prevalence of the cholera. The rumbling of other wheels than the dead cart and other voices than those of lamentation, break upon our ears.


"Travel upon the railroads, has vastly increased the past few days, cars and steamers come and go, freighted with heavy loads of merchandise for the prosecution of active fall trade."

"Produce which was in store, has mostly shipped abroad, and leaves the market bare. Wheat, however, may be quoted at 93 cents a bushel from teams and 95 cents on board. We hear of 1,000 bushels of corn at 44 cents, although we hear that the best would command 48 cents on board. Flour - none in market, no activity in other articles."

("Teams" means arriving by wagon; and "on board" is loaded on the ship).

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THE SANDUSKY CHOLERA CEMETERY on Harrison St. was neglected until 1924 when cleared and a monument to Cholera mass grave victims was erected.

Summer Crisis Program begins July 1 in Richland County

The Ohio Department of Development and Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. will help income-eligible Ohioans stay cool during the hot summer months. The Home Energy Assistance Summer Crisis Program provides eligible Ohioans assistance paying an electric bill or assistance paying for central air conditioning repairs. The program runs from July 1 until Sept. 30, 2022.

To apply for the program, clients are required to schedule an appointment with the Community Action Commission of Richland and Huron by calling 419-901-9539.

Clients need to bring copies of the following documents to their appointment:

- Copies of their most recent energy bills;
- A list of all household members and proof of income for the last 30 days or 12 months for each member;
- Proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members;
- Proof of disability (if applicable);
- Physician documentation that cooling assistance is needed for a household member's health (if there isn't a household member over the age of 60).

The Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. (AAA) is a non-profit agency that serves Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca, and Wyandot Counties. We have programs for all ages and income levels; however, we specialize in services and programs for older adults and anyone with disabilities. If you need assistance applying for programs such as HEAP, Medicare, Medicaid, Extra Help or other programs please contact our office at 419-524-4144 or 800-860-5799.

The Summer Crisis Program assists low-income households with an older household member (60 years or older), that can provide physician documentation that cooling assistance is needed for a household member's health, have a disconnect notice, have been shut off, are trying to establish new service on their electric bill, or require air conditioning. Conditions can include such things as lung disease, Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease, or asthma.

Also, Ohioans enrolled in the Percentage of Income Payment Plan Plus Program (PIPP) who meet the above criteria may be eligible for assistance towards their default PIPP payment, first PIPP payment, central air conditioning repairs, or may receive an air conditioning unit and/or fan.

Autumn is involved in student leadership, softball and volunteering. She wants to go to college to become a dentist. She is the daughter of Mike and Carol Taylor.

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

SIMPLE TOMATO SAUCE

Wondering what to do with all those tomatoes that will be ripening on your vines soon? Or do you just want a fresh idea for a quick sauce for your pasta?

Our original recipe calls for canned tomatoes, which you can still use, but here we are going to convert it to fresh tomatoes.



Cut all your tomatoes, season with olive oil, salt and pepper and toss them in a roasting pan. Make sure and add some garlic and if you have some Stock + Spice Tuscan seasoning that would be the perfect blend to sprinkle on top, if not use some Italian Seasoning.

Roast tomatoes in a 350 degree oven until they begin to get a bit crispy, at least 40–50 minutes. The tomato skins should be a little bit blackened. Transfer tomatoes to a blender or bowl (use immersion blender) but be careful with hot liquid. Blend and pour over your favorite plain pasta, ravioli or gnocchi.

Let's talk about the one thing that everyone wants to blame for their weight gain but no one wants to control. That's right, carbohydrates, the macro that gets the bad rap. Yes, it is the one macro that can sabotage you, but it is also one that we need for energy.

There are good carbs and there are some not-so-good carbs, then there are totally bad carbs. It is important not to lump them all together as bad and cut carbs altogether.

Yes, there are diets that totally cut carbs and yes, you can lose weight with them, but ask yourself is it a lifestyle you can sustain? If not, then it is temporary, and yo-yo dieting can destroy your metabolism.

Carbohydrates are our main source of energy. Let me share some other reasons why you should not totally cut your carbs.

athletic fields. Health Department staff will provide CPR training. According to Health Department data, sudden cardiac arrest is one of the leading causes of death in the United States for youth and adults.

•Third Street Family Health Services received a grant to purchase a mobile unit to provide Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) and therapy for Substance Use Disorder to people where transportation is a barrier to access. The mobile unit will offer other health care services such as dental care and vaccinations.

The Board of Trustees approved \$708,300 in college scholarships to 231 Richland County students. Scholarships are awarded based on a student's financial need and grade point average. The average scholarship amount was \$3,066.

In addition, the Board of Trustees awarded \$11,500 to students attending a career technical education school. 
