The City of Ontario, the Ontario Fourth of July Festival Committee and Spherion Mid Ohio presented this year's Miss Ontario Pageant at Ontario Middle School on Saturday, June 25.

The event was free to the public, but donations were accepted, enhancing the Miss Ontario Pageant Scholarship Fund.

Ontario Mayor Randy Hutchinson and Ontario City Council President Eddie Gallo welcomed the guests to the pageant. The national anthem was sung by seven-year-old Breckelle Miller. She was crowned the Ohio State American Amateur Talent Competition winner, receiving the Talent of the Year title at the Cinderella State Pageant in Columbus on March 14, 2021.

The Mistress of Ceremonies, Jami Kinton-Sluss, is the marketing director at Sluss Realty Company and the content coordinator for a new local magazine, *Greater Mansfield Living*. She is the lead host for Fusion LIVE, previously Radio Disney, where she travels around the country hosting live shows for kids and families.

Abigail Kern was crowned Miss Ontario 2022, receiving a \$1,000 scholarship amount from Spherion.

The festival will kick off with the second annual OYS Land Regatta on July 1 at Marshall Park.

"We are really excited to bring something new and different to the area. This year we have added many activities to our Friday night event. With the addition of a cornhole tournament, beer garden and car show, we are really looking for Friday to be a huge event. Our hope is to see an event that grows every year and attracts people to the area," said OYS Board Member, Brett Baxter.

Scott Derrickson's *The Black Phone* is a well done suspense/horror film based on a short story.

Set in Denver in 1978, a young brother and sister living with their alcoholic and abusive father (Jeremy Davies) are haunted by the kidnapping of children in their area. The young girl named Gwen has a mysterious psychic ability and is able to help police with their investigation.

Soon, her brother is kidnapped by a man known as the Grabber.

The young boy is named Finney and is played by a very good young actor named Mason Thames. Madeleine McGraw is even better as his sister.

Soon, Finney is alone in an isolated basement with a mattress, a toilet and a disconnected phone on the wall. The phone then rings, as the previously kidnapped children start to speak to Finney.

The movie is very straightforward but also really intriguing. Derrickson gives us hints about how Finney can escape the room and then makes the audience forget about those moments



until the end. There are a few jumpy scenes as the suspense builds up. Ethan Hawke gives a terrific, haunting performance as the Grabber with a new mask that is pretty frightening.

Derrickson's direction is top notch as he definitely has horror credibility with *The Exorcism of Emily Rose* and the very scary *Sinister*.

Here he frames the story very well and uses different filmmaking techniques such as showing Gwen's psychic abilities through grainy-style looking footage. He has this cast do so much with these characters and all of them are effective in their roles, especially Hawke who never gets the recognition he deserves.

Check out *The Black Phone* for an engaging story, suspenseful setting and fun time at the movies. The short story really works well on the big screen and the mysterious parts involving the phone are even more intriguing. I really enjoyed this one.

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The Debutante and the Cow Pasture

Paul Gages was a busy man. He farmed and had a milk route in what is now eastern Ontario.

Remembered is the special visitor in the late 1920s. Lo and behold an airplane landed in his cow pasture and one can only imagine his surprise when a woman pilot emerged from the craft. Women were not expected to do that sort of thing!

It was none other than Ruth Nichols who would later be dubbed "The Flying Debutante." She had made a forced landing on the Gages family farm.

The late Paul Gages Jr. recalled his dad drove her to Mansfield for assistance. That started the elder Gages interest in aviation. He soon turned his cow pasture into an airplane landing field which was just south of Park Avenue West. He later turned the land into a planned development called Maple Grove Development, located on the present day Ireland and Scotland Boulevards.

Gages farmed, had a milk route until 1924-'25, built houses and ran the air field, in addition to owning several airplanes over the years.

In 1928, he moved the airfield further west to the intersection of Beer Rd. and the Rt. 30 bypass.

Ruth Nichols was an amazing person. Born in New York, her father was a member of the New York Stock Exchange and at her graduation from high school in 1919, her father's graduation gift was her first airplane ride with pilot Eddie Stinson.

In college she secretly took flying lessons.

She received public fame when she was co-pilot with Harry Rodgers on a flight from New York to Miami. Due to her socialite upbringing, the press dubbed her as the "Flying Debutant," a name she hated.

She would go on to set high altitude records reaching 28,743 ft. in an open aircraft at a 60 below temperature, speed records of 210 MPH and became the first woman to fly across the Atlantic Ocean.

She survived several crashes in which one left her unable to fly for over a year.

Fame followed her everywhere. She worked for the Civil Air Patrol during World War II. She never married.

During a period of depression, she died from an overdose on September 25, 1960, at age 57. Some of the records she set would hold until more modern planes were built.

The Gages Air Field was sold to General Motors in 1955.

Voter registration deadline for August primary is July 5

The deadline to register to vote or change an address and/or name for the Aug. 2, 2022 Primary Election is Tuesday, July 5. The Board of Elections office will be open that evening until 9 pm and is located at 1495 W. Longview Ave., Suite 101 in the Longview Center. After 4 pm visitors must use the entrance at the lower level back parking area at the southwest corner of the building.

Qualifications for registering to vote include that the voter must:

- be either a native U. S. citizen, or a naturalized citizen of the U.S.
- be a resident of Richland County and Ohio 30 days prior to an election

- be a minimum of 18 years of age on or before the date of the General Election on Nov. 8, 2022.

Registered voters who have moved or changed their name must notify the board office in writing or in person. Voters who are currently registered in Ohio may change their address online at VoteOhio.gov but must do it by the July 5 deadline. Online registration is also now available at VoteOhio.gov

In addition to the office, citizens may register or complete a change of address/name at the following locations in Richland County:

- Any library branch
- All city and village hall offices
- The Bureau of Motor Vehicles office
- The Department of Human Services
- The Richland County Courthouse (Recorder or Treasurer Offices)
- All area high school offices

Registration forms may also be obtained at www.boe.ohio.gov/richland or requested by mail. Contact the board office at 419-774-5530 to have a form sent by mail. Completed voter registration forms must be postmarked 30 days prior to Election Day.

Senators working to make sure American flags are Made in America

This month, we celebrated Flag Day. Next week, Ohioans and Americans across the country will celebrate Independence Day, often with parades and visits to monuments and memorials, where they'll proudly wave American flags.

But right now, the flags flying at military installations and other government offices often don't reflect the values that our veterans sacrificed so much for. Today, the flags the federal government purchases are only required to be made from just 50 percent American-made materials. That means that half of the materials that our women and men in uniform fight under can be made in China.

That's why I joined Senator Susan Collins, and our colleagues in the House, Tim Ryan and Shontel Brown, to once again introduce our bipartisan All-American Flag Act. This legislation would require the federal government to buy flags that are produced entirely with American-made materials and are manufactured in the U.S.

These efforts build on the work we did with Senator Portman when we passed the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill last year, which included the strongest ever Buy America rules. Those rules will require all infrastructure projects be done using American iron and steel, produced by American workers.

Whether you're talking about flags or construction materials – American tax dollars should go toward American-made products that support American jobs, period. We need to produce the symbol of our country in a way that supports American workers and American manufacturers.

We can ensure that American-made flags will be waved and flown in all corners of the country. From the flags in the hands of new Americans at citizenship and naturalization ceremonies, to the flag at your local post office, to the flag flying over the U.S. Capitol Building, we should commit to making them in America.

New flag donated to replace “Old Glory” ripped during recent storms

After the recent storms that swept through the Richland County and surrounding areas, the large American flag that flies over the Love's Truck Stop at Interstate 71 and State Route 97 in Bellville began to rip. Once a flag begins to tear, it needs to be replaced.

On Tuesday, June 21, a dedication ceremony took place in Bellville in front of the gazebo. The ceremony was held by several Richland County Veterans groups including the Korean War Veterans Association and the Veterans Service Commission as they donated a massive flag to replace the current damaged one.

It's a challenge to keep such a large flag flying at that spot. Mayor of Bellville Teri Brenkus explained that such a massive size flag can only be repaired up to a maximum of 10 feet before it must be retired. The flagpole is over 130 feet tall and weighs over 7,000 pounds. It can be expensive to keep a well-maintained flag flying in good condition, as each flag is over \$2,000.

After contacting the Richland County Veterans Service Commission, Brenkus found that there was another replacement flag kept for this very purpose. President of the Richland County Veterans Service Commission, Doug Theaker, decided this was a perfect opportunity to present this to the Mayor of Bellville.

This new flag is 30x60 feet and weighs about 80 pounds. The damaged flag is repaired free of charge by a local company called TLC Kanvas Designs in Mansfield. They have graciously offered to

donate the supplies and labor to restitch any flag that is damaged. They are happy to be helping in this way to honor the flag and the veterans.

Doug Theaker said that the flag that flies over the Love Station is probably the largest flag in Ohio. Ken Estep brought the flag to the ceremony in a large box. The flag was then put up early the next morning by the maintenance crew of Bellville. Due to its great size and weight, this is an awesome task.

Theaker said, “I’m a very patriotic person and I love America. Like many other proud Americans, I served in the United States Navy and love the symbolism of the stars and stripes! Old Glory, they call it. When I drive down Interstate 71 and see that huge, beautiful flag flying high over the Love’s Station, my heart beats a little bit faster.”

Dale Walker is the current president of the Korean War Veterans Association, Chapter 51, of Richland County. He was excited to be able to present this flag to the Mayor of Bellville. He said, “It’s really inspiring and I’m so thankful for the city of Bellville to receive this flag and for our group and the Richland County Veterans Service Commission to be able to present it to them. It touches my heart to see that American flag flying over the proud community of Bellville!”

Ken Estep, executive director at the Veterans Service Commission appreciates the fact that no matter where they are from, veterans can drive by this beautiful flag on I-71 and feel their service is appreciated.

The Red Cross is screening all blood, platelet and plasma donations from self-identified African American donors for the sickle cell trait. This additional screening will provide black donors with an additional health insight and help the Red Cross identify compatible blood types more quickly to help patients with sickle cell disease. Blood transfusion is an essential treatment for those with sickle cell disease, and blood donations from individuals of the same race, ethnicity and blood type have a unique ability to help patients fighting sickle cell disease.

Donors can expect to receive sickle cell trait screening results, if applicable, within one to two weeks through the Red Cross Blood Donor App and the online donor portal at [RedCrossBlood.org](https://www.RedCrossBlood.org).

The Red Cross follows a high standard of safety and infection control. The Red Cross will continue to socially distance wherever possible at blood drives, donation centers and facilities.

While donors are no longer required to wear a face mask, individuals may choose to continue to wear a mask for any reason. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at a drive.

All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in.

Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive.

Cisco Certified Technicians have the skills to diagnose, restore, repair, and replace critical Cisco networking and system devices at customer sites. The CCT certification is part of the Cisco Networking Academy curriculum that is taught in the Computer Network Technology lab.

Cisco Certified Technician Routing and Switching (CCT Routing and Switching) certification focus on the skills required for onsite support and maintenance of Cisco routers, switches, and oper-

ating environments. Technicians in this area must be able to identify Cisco router and switch models, accessories, cabling, and interfaces; understand the Cisco IOS Software operating modes and identify commonly found software, and be able to use the Cisco Command Line Interface (CLI) to connect and service products. Achieving CCT Routing and Switching certification is considered the best foundation for supporting other Cisco devices and systems.

In order to earn the certification, each student has to pass a proctored exam with no access to learning materials or the Internet. This certification is recognized by the Ohio Department of Education and the Information Technology (IT) industry as a recognized credential.

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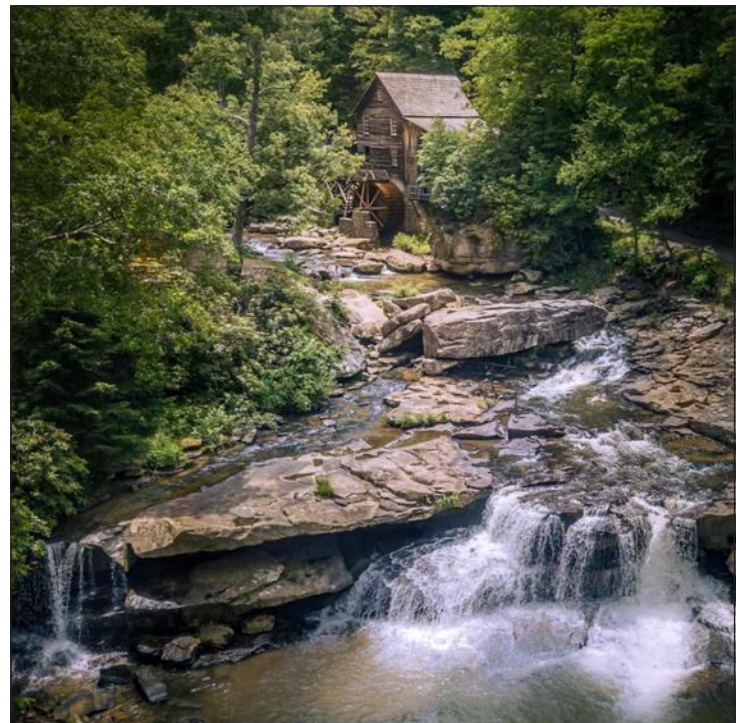
