# METRICH region collects over 1,385 pounds of medication

The METRICH Enforcement Unit along with the Mansfield Division of Police, the Richland County Sheriff's Office, the Shelby Police Department, Lexington Police Department, Plymouth Police Department, Community Action for Capable Youth (CACY), Richland County Solid Waste Authority, Richland Public Health, and the Richland County Mental Health & Recovery Services Board, participated in the Drug Enforcement Administration's (DEA) National Prescription Take Back Initiative on April 25.

In addition to Richland County law enforcement agencies, numerous other law enforcement agencies from the METRICH region also participated. The METRICH region collected over 1,385 pounds of unused or expired prescription/ medication. Community participation and commitment by all law enforcement agencies in the METRICH region was key to the success of this event.

In Richland County, the Mansfield Police Department collected 89.8 pounds. Other location totals were Richland County Sheriff's Office, 29 lbs., Shelby Police Department, 23.8 lbs., Lexington Police Department, 20 lbs. and Plymouth Police Department, 17 lbs.

Other collection site totals were Ashland County Sheriff's Office, 157 lbs.; Bucyrus Police Department, 91.4 lbs.; Galion Police Department 90.5 lbs.; Crawford County Sheriff's Office, 74.8 lbs.; Hancock County Sheriff's Office, 87 lbs.; Norwalk Police Department, 75.2 lbs.; Fredericktown Police Department, 29.5 lbs.; Mt. Vernon Police Department, 84.4 lbs.; Knox County Sheriff's Office/Centerburg, 24 lbs.; Marion County Sheriff's Office/Marion Police Department, 154.4 lbs.; Morrow County Sheriff's Office, 140.04 lbs.; Cardington Police Department, 5.14 lbs.; Fostoria Police Department, 17.07 lbs.; Tiffin Police Department, 41.8 lbs.; Seneca County Sheriff's Office, 52.2 lbs.; Wyandot County Sheriff's Office, 36.6 lbs.; Upper Sandusky Police Department, 24.6 lbs.; and Carey Police Department, 20.4 lbs.

METRICH is a ten-county decentralized task force in North Central Ohio whose mission is to improve the quality of life for the citizens we serve by reducing the availability of illegal drugs and weapons through proactive enforcement efforts.

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## “Unearth a Story” exhibition invites artists of all ages to dig into the past

The Mansfield Public Art Commission, in partnership with the Mansfield Richland County Main Public Library, has announced a prehistoric-themed call for art: “Unearth a Story™.”

This exhibition coincides with the library’s summer reading program and invites the community to explore the wonders of history, paleontology and the hidden narratives buried beneath the earth.

The slogan “Unearth a Story™” opens a world of creativity, from uncovering hidden histories or exploring the past, the slogan under-

scores the joy of discovery that reading brings. It also emphasizes that every person and every community has stories waiting to be found and shared.

In a move to foster community-wide creativity, this year’s exhibition is open to all age groups, from budding young paleontologists to professional adult artists. Submissions can be a variety of media, including painting, photography, digital art, textiles and mixed media.

“Art is about discovery,” said Jennifer Pennell, Public Art Commission Chair. “With the ‘Unearth a Story’ theme, we want to see Mansfield’s collective imagination come to life — bridging the gap between the ancient past and our creative present.”

The deadline for entries is Friday, May 29. A notification of acceptance will be issued the week of June 1 and the exhibition opens Monday, June 15.

Artists may submit up to three pieces for consideration. All works must be original and ready to hang. Original art may be listed for sale or not for sale. Any art sales would be communicated directly to the artist, and the Public Art Commission and library would not take any commission to facilitate the sale beyond providing the artist’s contact info.

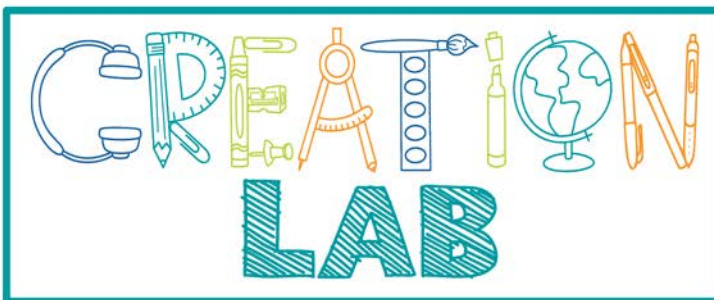
Students will be able to visit community agencies that would benefit from volunteers this summer and beyond. Access will be provided during the student advisory periods, from approximately noon to 1 pm.

# Milk & Honey celebrates ribbon cutting in Shelby

**SHELBY** — A dream years in the making came to life Friday morning as community members, local leaders and supporters gathered for the official ribbon cutting of Milk & Honey, a new mission-driven coffee shop in downtown Shelby.

Held at 11 am on May 1, the ceremony marked more than just the opening of a business — it celebrated the launch of a space rooted in hope, healing and opportunity.

Owned and founded by Kimberly Mosler, Milk & Honey is designed as a social enterprise that employs and supports women recovering from trauma, substance abuse and human trafficking. The shop’s motto, “every cup is a promise fulfilled,” reflects its deeper purpose — each purchase directly contributes to restoring lives.

“This has been something we’ve been praying for,” Mosler said during the ceremony. “We hope this becomes a pillar of light in the community — a place where people feel invited, welcomed, seen and valued.”

The ribbon cutting drew praise from city officials and representatives from the Richland Area Chamber & Economic Development, who highlighted both the business investment and its broader impact.

“This is a great day for Shelby,” Mayor Schag noted. “Milk & Honey is truly a blend of ministry, business and blessing — where every transaction has an impact far beyond the cup.”

Chamber leaders also commended Mosler’s continued dedication to the community, describing her work as inspiring and transformative for the lives of others.

Located near a growing downtown plaza, the coffee shop features a modern, upscale design paired with intentional gathering spaces — from open, light-filled work areas to cozy corners complete with

a fireplace. The layout encourages both productivity and connection, inviting guests to linger rather than simply grab-and-go.

“We wanted to create something different,” Mosler said. “A place where people can meet, build relationships, or just sit and be.”

Milk & Honey offers a variety of specialty espresso drinks and handcrafted beverages, including signature lattes and in-house cold foam with a crème brûlée-inspired flavor.

But beyond the menu, the heart of the business lies in its mission. Through its connection to local outreach efforts, the shop provides employment opportunities and support systems for women working to rebuild their lives — creating what Mosler described as a “full-circle” model of care and empowerment.

Community members in attendance reflected that sense of purpose throughout the event, celebrating not only a new gathering place but an inspiring investment in people.

“This is a full-circle moment for me,” Mosler said. “I was once that broken woman, walking through the same kind of pain we’re now helping others overcome.

To stand here today and create something that gives other women a chance — it means everything to me.”

Milk & Honey is now open Monday through Friday from 6 am to 3 pm, and Saturdays from 7 am to 2 pm, welcoming the community to experience both its coffee and its mission.

With the snip of the ribbon, Milk & Honey began its next chapter — serving more than coffee, but offering hope, purpose and new beginnings. Each visit now carries an impact far beyond the cup, helping to change lives one story at a time.

## Heritage Ohio launches state-wide initiative to spotlight and celebrate 250 historic Ohio buildings

Heritage Ohio is launching a new statewide initiative grounded in a simple but powerful idea: every building has a story to tell. In honor of America 250, “250 Buildings, 250 Stories” will identify, elevate and focus attention on 250 historic buildings across Ohio, connecting their past, present and future by telling their stories.

Historic buildings are often seen as challenges. Heritage Ohio is reframing that narrative and positioning them as economic assets and community anchors with untapped potential.

“Every building represents a story,” said Matt Wiederhold, Executive Director of Heritage Ohio. “Some represent successful reinvestment. Some have been the location for events and occasions of both local and statewide significance. Others are waiting for their next chapter. This initiative is about bringing those stories forward and using them to expand the revitalization that is already occurring across Ohio, but also to highlight buildings that need investment before they are lost forever.”

Heritage Ohio invites anyone to nominate and submit an Ohio building for consideration, including community members, local leaders, property owners, organizations, and preservation advocates alike.

Submissions are encouraged from both large and small communities across Ohio, ensuring that the full diversity of the State’s historic places is represented. This inclusive approach ensures that meaningful stories are revealed from every corner of the state.

Buildings may be nominated in three categories: Celebrated 250, which features completed rehabilitation projects that demonstrate successful reinvestment; Opportunity 250, which identifies buildings at risk or ready for investment and redevelopment; and Legacy 250, which recognizes structures with significant historical or cultural legacies. Together, these three categories create a comprehensive picture of Ohio’s historic built environment by honoring past successes while identifying future opportunities.

Nominated buildings will be featured on Heritage Ohio’s Facebook and Instagram pages as well as on LinkedIn and in the quarterly Heritage Ohio newsletter, Revitalize Ohio.

The goal of 250 Buildings, 250 Stories is not just to document history but to activate it. The 250 Buildings, 250 Stories will also be recognized at the Heritage Ohio state conference, to be held in Cincinnati Sept. 29 to Oct. 1, 2026.
