Community rallies to help replace wheelchair-accessible van

ONTARIO — A wheelchair lift suddenly gave way. A family celebration nearly turned into a tragedy.

For the family of lifetime local resident Joni Davis, a routine trip to

celebrate a wedding anniversary became a frightening reminder that their aging wheelchair-accessible van could no longer be trusted.

"We were getting ready to go out for our 41st anniversary," Davis said. "If I had been on the lift when it failed, I could have been severely injured."

The family's 2005 Chevrolet Express wheelchair van has served them for years, but the aging lift system has become increasingly unreliable. Repairs have been made several times, including a recent \$600 fix that lasted less than a month.

Some replacement parts are no longer available because of the lift's age, leaving the family with few options.

"We've had it fixed three or four times now," Davis said. "We're constantly putting money into it."

Now, family members, friends, church supporters and community volunteers are working together to help raise funds for a replacement wheelchair-accessible van.

A recent community sale in Ontario helped benefit the effort.

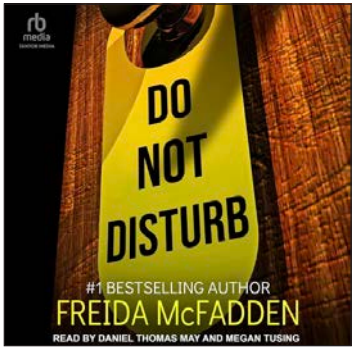

Senate passes Romanchuk bill expanding patient access to flu and COVID treatment

The Ohio Senate passed Senate Bill 230, sponsored by Senator Mark Romanchuk (R-Ontario), which authorizes pharmacists to diagnose and treat common health conditions.

"This legislation focuses on putting patients first," said Senator Romanchuk. "By allowing busy Ohioans a convenient option to receive treatment for the flu, COVID-19, strep, and other common illnesses, we provide sick Ohioans with peace of mind and help prevent the unnecessary spread of illnesses."

SB 230 authorizes certified pharmacists to diagnose and provide treatment to people who are at least five years of age for three common illness: influenza, strep throat, and COVID-19.

To treat these illnesses, pharmacists must follow a state written protocol developed by the State Board of Pharmacy. Under SB 230, health insurers and Medicaid are required to provide coverage for these services.

"Pharmacists are among the most accessible healthcare professionals in Ohio," added Senator Romanchuk. "Senate Bill 230 represents a practical, evidence-based expansion of care. I'm proud to have championed this legislation."

The Ohio Senate sent SB 230 to the Ohio House for further consideration.

Steven Spielberg's *Disclosure* Day is his newest sci-fi adventure. Emily Blunt plays a meteorologist who starts to experience strange feelings and able to have personal knowledge about any person she meets. A dual plotline involves Daniel (Josh O'Connor), a government worker who is being tracked down for his knowledge and theft of classified UFO footage he plans releasing to the world. Colin Firth is the head of an organization tracking them both.

This movie is very engaging for most of its run time and everyone gives a great performance, especially Blunt who is a stand out. Spielberg's direction is great as always especially during the car chase and train sequence.

The flaws of the movie come with David Koepp's script introducing some ideas that never

ally come to fruition. There is an alien device used throughout the movie that could have been given more of a backstory and explanation.

I have also been reflecting on the ending and third act for a couple days and am still mixed on it. For every interesting scene and exciting sequence, there is was one that did not seem to be as engaging.

Disclosure Day is a very interesting alien type movie and is different but not near as good as *E.T.* or *Close Encounters of the Third Kind*. The performances and direction and score by John Williams are a standout. This feels like mid tier Spielberg though, a solid watch but not near his best.

Invasive plants class is June 23

Non-native and invasive plants often move in and set-up shop even on smaller pieces of land, outcompeting native plants, reducing wildlife habitat and impacting the health and resiliency of the forest.

The Ohio Woodland Stewards Program and Richland Soil & Water Conservation District will host a hands-on evening class on invasive plant identification, management and control strategies, and demonstrations of effective treatment methods on Tuesday, June 23, at 5 pm at the Ohio State University Mansfield Molyet Village Community Center, 1365 Springmill Rd., Mansfield. The registration fee is \$15 per person for the class and covers a pizza dinner and all materials.

At 8 pm, community members are invited to join class participants and the evening's organizers to remove invasive species on campus. With the days getting longer the sun doesn't set until later and hot daytime temperatures will be avoided.

MANSFIELD — Applause filled the room. Residents mingled with staff. Gold decorations shimmered as The Waterford at Mansfield celebrated a distinction earned by only a small fraction of senior living communities across North America.

The Waterford hosted its “Best of the Best” celebration on Wednesday, June 10, after receiving both the 2026 Best in Senior Living Award and All-Star recognition from A Place for Mom, a leading senior living referral service.

Germann noted that the national award is reserved for only the highest-performing senior living communities and praised The Waterford’s dedication to resident well-being, compassionate caregiving and programs that promote dignity, independence and quality of life.

The celebration also highlighted the people behind the recognition. Community leaders introduced members of the management team, caregivers, wellness staff, activities department and therapy partners who contribute to daily life at The Waterford.

One of the most heartfelt moments came from family member Mark RAU, who shared his family’s experience after searching for memory care support for his mother.

RAU said his family was facing the difficult reality of advancing dementia and wanted to find a place where his mother would be safe and supported. After touring The Waterford, he felt confident they had found the right community.

“Right off the bat, the first thing I knew was this was the place that she needed to be,” RAU said. “We couldn’t ask for better care, a better family. The staff is professional and loving to my mother. As soon as I walk into this community, I feel at ease because my mother is in good hands. It’s clean and has a home-like feel.”

He credited both residents and staff for creating a welcoming atmosphere and praised the care his mother received at Waterford.

“The care that they provide, the staff here, the concern for everybody’s well-being. You couldn’t ask for a better place,” RAU said. “This place is amazing.”

Community rallies to help replace wheelchair-accessible van

Organizers described the event as a large “pickers market” featuring furniture, antiques, jewelry, household goods, children’s items, décor, tools and more.

The family hopes to purchase a 2023 Voyager wheelchair-accessible van through Mobility Works. The vehicle is currently being held for them, but time is limited.

The van costs approximately \$51,000. Through a waiver program, the first \$10,000 will be covered, leaving the family responsible for about \$41,000. Supporters have already contributed nearly \$5,100 in just a few weeks through donations, fundraisers and community efforts. The family estimates another \$5,000 is needed by June 25 to make the purchase financially manageable through monthly payments.

“People have been so generous,” Davis said. “Some donations were left anonymously. We don’t even know who gave them.”

The need is urgent. Mobility Works currently has the van reserved for the family, but the hold expires during the first week of July. If financing details are not finalized by then, the vehicle will return to the market.

Without a reliable accessible vehicle, everyday activities have become difficult. The family has spent nearly \$4,000 in recent weeks renting a wheelchair-accessible van so Joni could attend medical appointments, graduations and important family events.

“I won’t have a vehicle as of now until we get this worked out,” Davis said. “We’re praying for this to all work out, otherwise I’ll be homebound without this much-needed vehicle.”

For Joni, transportation is about more than getting from place to place. It represents the ability to continue serving others.

A 1984 graduate of Ontario High School, Davis has lived with severe health challenges for decades. Diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis, osteoarthritis and psoriatic arthritis, she has relied on a wheelchair since the early 2000s. Today she depends on a Hoyer lift for transfers and receives monthly infusions to help manage chronic pain and inflammation.

Despite those limitations, she remains active in ministry. Davis serves as a children’s ministry leader at her church, helps coordinate outreach efforts and volunteers whenever she is able.

“It’s very important to me to have a vehicle where I can get out and help other people,” she said.

Her husband, Jeff Davis, has been her primary caregiver for years while facing significant challenges of his own.

A 1984 graduate of Clear Fork High School, Jeff lived with epilepsy and has battled post-traumatic stress disorder following a serious cement truck accident in 2010. In 2022, he faced a series of major health setbacks, including rotator cuff surgery, prostate surgery and a rare psychogenic neurological disorder that mimics stroke symptoms.

Through it all, he continued caring for Joni.

Helping others has become a defining characteristic of the couple’s life together.

More than two decades ago, when Joni needed an electric scooter to maintain her independence, Jeff rode his bicycle from Ontario to Olive Hill, Kentucky, to raise money for the purchase.

The couple has spent years helping neighbors, churches, nonprofits and community members in need. They have supported efforts such as the Sluss Realty Toy Drive, Richland Outreach Center and numerous families facing emergencies and difficult circumstances. Even before learning they would need to replace their van, they regularly stepped in to help others whenever they were able.

“When you help and give to others first, your problems seem smaller,” Joni said.

Jeff also operates a small lawn-care ministry after finishing his full-time workday. He mows yards for elderly residents, individuals with disabilities and others who cannot physically maintain their property. Some pay what they can. Others offer a sandwich, a cold drink or simply a heartfelt thank you.

“He just loves helping people,” Joni said.

Jeff and Joni Davis have also operated Bear Haven Bakers from their home for the past decade, creating specialty cookies, cakes, pies, breads and other baked goods. The business has become another way to support both their family and community causes.

“Everything we make right now is helping toward the van,” Davis said.

Supporters can also purchase baked goods directly from the family, with all proceeds benefiting the wheelchair van fund. Additional fundraising opportunities are planned throughout the summer, including baked-goods sales during Concerts in the Park at Marshall Park. The family expressed appreciation to Kenn Spencer and Ontario Community Events for allowing them to participate in the events.

Their commitment to serving others has not stopped despite their own urgent need.

Even while working to replace their wheelchair-accessible van, Jeff and Joni continue volunteering throughout the community. The

couple is currently assisting with a SERTOMA fundraiser and craft show scheduled for June 21 at the Mansfield Fire Museum. SERTOMA helps families throughout Richland County and surrounding communities who have deaf and hard-of-hearing children by providing equipment, services and resources.

The transportation challenges have already affected the family's ability to participate in church activities and community events. Without a dependable wheelchair-accessible vehicle, many of the ministries and volunteer efforts they enjoy become impossible.

Even while the family works to secure a van of their own, Davis is already thinking about how they can help others facing similar challenges. Her long-term goal is to create an outreach effort called "Helping Hearts & Giving Hands" that would assist other families facing the high cost of obtaining wheelchair-accessible transportation.

"If 340 churches or businesses gave \$100, the van would be paid for," Davis said. "Then we could start helping another family."

"I'd love to continue this next year and just keep blessing other people," she said. "We've always been the ones helping others. That's what we want to keep doing."

For Davis, the outpouring of support has been both humbling and encouraging.

"The community's been generous," she said. "We're thankful for every person who's helped."

For many who know Joni and Jeff Davis, the community's generosity is simply being returned. After decades spent serving others through ministry, caregiving, fundraising, lawn care, baking and countless acts of kindness, friends and neighbors are now stepping forward to help a family that has spent much of its life helping everyone else.

MANSFIELD — Applause filled the courtyard. Ice cream melted in the summer heat as raindrops moved the event indoors the Eisenhower Hall building of the Ohio State Mansfield campus. Community leaders, educators and elected officials gathered last Monday afternoon, June 8 to celebrate two national honors that placed Richland County's higher education institutions in the national spotlight.

The Ohio State University at Mansfield and North Central State College were recognized for achievements that leaders say reflect years of commitment to student success, affordability and community impact.

North Central State College received the Leah Meyer Austin Award from Achieving the Dream, the organization's highest honor. The award recognizes colleges that demonstrate exceptional results in student achievement, completion rates and workforce outcomes.

Ohio State Mansfield earned the Carnegie Opportunity College designation, a distinction awarded to institutions that provide high access to higher education while helping students achieve strong economic outcomes after graduation. The campus is one of just 478 colleges and universities nationwide to receive the designation.

Jessica Gribben, president and CEO of the Richland Area Chamber & Economic Development, said the awards confirm what many in the community already know.

"We already know what gems you are here in our community," Gribben said. "But to have that recognition be on the national stage for both institutions is a huge accomplishment."

Representatives from several state and federal offices attended the celebration, including staff from the offices of U.S. Sen. John Husted, Auditor of State Keith Faber, Secretary of State Frank LaRose, Congressman Jim Jordan and state lawmakers.

State Sen. Mark Romanchuk praised both institutions for their collaborative approach and student-centered focus.

"We've been blessed to have very good leadership," Romanchuk said. "We've also been blessed to have leadership of these institutions working together, especially when you're on the same campus, is very, very important."

He noted that both schools have consistently focused on meeting community needs while preparing students for careers and future success.

Jason Opal, dean and director of Ohio State Mansfield, said the recognition shines a light on work that often happens behind the scenes.

"This is about bringing attention to a lot of work that's typically unseen," Opal said. "Student outcomes and student success don't always make headlines, but they require intensive work and dedication."

Opal said Ohio State Mansfield serves students from throughout north central and northeastern Ohio while maintaining the feel of a small college connected to one of the nation's largest university systems.

He also reflected on the broader mission of higher education. "We want the opportunity to belong to the people," Opal said. "Here in North Central Ohio, we're doing the job of making opportunities a real thing for people."

North Central State College President Dr. Dorey Diab said the Le-

ah Meyer Austin Award reflects years of progress in helping students persist, graduate and advance into successful careers.

"What does student success mean?" Diab asked. "It's about students finishing a course, finishing a semester, moving from one year to the next, earning a certificate, earning an associate degree, and continuing on to a bachelor's degree."

Diab shared several milestones demonstrating the college's impact across the region.

Since opening 57 years ago, North Central State College has graduated more than 17,000 students. The college serves between 3,000 and 4,000 students annually and has earned repeated recognition as a Leader College of Distinction through Achieving the Dream.

Since 2010, 791 students have completed associate degrees while still in high school, saving families years of tuition costs. During that same period, nearly 13,000 dual-enrollment students earned more than 200,000 college credit hours, resulting in an estimated \$38 million in tuition savings.

The college's Tuition Freedom Scholarship program has helped more than 1,000 students from 50 area high schools continue their education tuition-free during the past four years. Today, 88% of North Central students receive grants or scholarships, while 70% graduate without student loan debt.

Diab emphasized that the benefits extend far beyond the classroom.

"When students graduate, they're able to find better jobs with better salaries and benefits," she said. "That creates more community prosperity, and we all benefit from that."

He also noted that higher educational attainment is linked to stronger workforce development, increased civic engagement, improved health outcomes, lower crime rates and a higher overall quality of life.

The recognition of both institutions highlights what community leaders described as a powerful regional partnership focused on access, affordability and opportunity.

At a time when higher education faces challenges nationwide, Mansfield's two institutions are drawing attention for doing what they have quietly done for years — helping students succeed and strengthening the communities they call home.

"We are excited equally about this fall," said Cindy Wood, '93, M.Ed., Director of Development and Community Relations. "The investment of Ohio State into the Regional Campus Commitment for eligible students to attend Mansfield campus at zero cost is another way, alongside the Buckeye Opportunity Grant for eligible families, to attend Ohio State Mansfield with zero tuition — expanding access and opportunity for those who wish an Ohio State degree and are eligible. We are projecting an increase in enrollment for Fall 2026, largely with increases reflecting the Richland region's interest in pursuing higher education."



Celebration highlights progress at former Westinghouse site

MANSFIELD — Music echoed across the former Westinghouse property as families filled the site for a day of activities, entertainment and community celebration. As darkness fell, fireworks illuminated the skyline and highlighted a new chapter for one of Mansfield’s most recognizable industrial landmarks.

Hundreds attended last Saturday’s East Fifth Street Celebration, a free community event highlighting ongoing efforts to transform the former Westinghouse property from a long-vacant brownfield into a future community asset.

The day brought together residents, community organizations, local businesses and redevelopment partners to celebrate progress while sharing a vision for what comes next on the 14-acre site.

Throughout the morning and afternoon, families enjoyed a Children’s Festival featuring giant bounce houses, interactive exhibits and educational activities. The Performance Dogs of Ohio entertained crowds with demonstrations, while the Mansfield Fire Department introduced children to its junior training program.

Community organizations also participated throughout the day. The Mansfield/Richland County Public Library hosted yard games, United Way brought its Big Red Bookshelf program, and the Buckeye Imagination Museum offered traveling exhibits. YMCA staff provided activities through Y on the Fly.

Athletes competed in a volleyball tournament during the afternoon, while skateboarders showcased their skills during Skate Ohio’s “Attack the Spot” event.

As evening arrived, visitors gathered for live entertainment, food trucks and a beer garden. Northern Downpour opened the evening music lineup before Shucking Bubba took the stage later in the night.

The celebration concluded with a fireworks display that illuminated the former industrial property and symbolized the site’s ongoing transformation.

One of the day’s most popular attractions was Elektro the Robot, who returned to the former Westinghouse site where his story began. Recently acquired by the Weeks family, Elektro is scheduled to become a centerpiece of the North Central Ohio Industrial Museum at the Ohio State Reformatory this fall.

Built by Westinghouse engineers in Mansfield between 1937 and 1938, Elektro debuted at the 1939 New York World’s Fair and quickly captured the public imagination as one of the world’s first celebrity robots. At a time when robots were not designed to perform labor but to inspire curiosity, Elektro represented a vision of innovation and the future.

During World War II, Elektro was stored in the basement of Westinghouse engineer John Weeks Sr., becoming part of everyday family life. He later returned to Westinghouse and continued touring throughout the 1940s and 1950s, promoting the promise of a modern, technology-driven home.

Renewed interest in mid-century industrial design led to Elektro’s rediscovery. With

the help of descendants of the original engineering team, the robot was reassembled and eventually displayed at the Mansfield Memorial Museum, where he remained on view until 2023.

In 2025, Elektro was formally returned to the Weeks family. Brothers John Weeks and Lowell Weeks have since assumed responsibility for his care, documentation and restoration. Their efforts, along with a dedicated team of supporters, continue to preserve one of Mansfield’s most unique pieces of industrial history.

Elektro is preparing to take his place at the North Central Ohio Industrial Museum in 2026, where his story will continue as part of the region’s deep industrial and technological legacy.

The event also highlighted the future of the former Westinghouse property, which has long served as a reminder of Mansfield’s manufacturing heritage. Community leaders

envision the site to become a vibrant district featuring public gathering spaces, green areas, improved street connections and a mix of residential, commercial and recreational uses.

Plans outlined in the Westinghouse Site Reuse Plan identify opportunities to attract investment, strengthen surrounding neighborhoods and create new spaces where residents can live, work and gather.

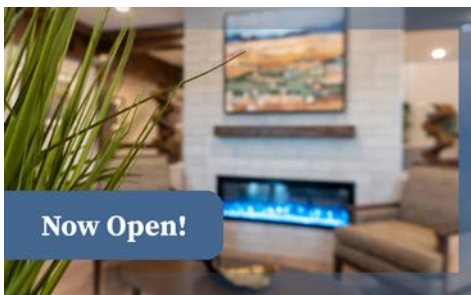
Organizers said the celebration was designed not only to showcase progress already made, but also to encourage community involvement as redevelopment efforts continue.

For many attendees, the event offered a chance to see firsthand how a once-idle industrial site could become an important part of Mansfield’s future.

For a site that once helped power America’s industrial future, Saturday’s celebration offered a glimpse of what its next chapter may become — a place where history, community and new opportunities come together.

SB 52 now goes to Governor DeWine for signature.

The event brings together more than 19,000 attendees, including students, instructors, industry partners, government officials, administrators, and more.

The highlight of the NLSC is the SkillsUSA Championships, where more than 6,500 state champions compete for national gold, silver, and bronze medals in 114 skilled and leadership competitions.

MACC students honored during annual graduation ceremony

Madison Adult Career Center (MACC) held its annual graduation for 137 students completing Career Development Programs during the 2025-'26 school year on Friday, June 12. Thirty-eight students also earned an adult high school diploma.

MACC holds its annual graduation ceremony to recognize students who have met or are on track to meet graduation requirements by Oct. 31. Five graduates were nominated by their instructor(s) for Student of the Year: Taylor Berry, Dental Assisting; Kelsey Henry, Medical Assisting Technologies (daytime); Lauren Hodge, Phlebotomy/EKG; Jessica Hoffman, Medical Assisting Technologies (evening); and Josiah Remy, Welding Technology. The 2025-'26 Student of the Year is Josiah Remy.

Students graduated from career development programs: Advanced Cosmetology, Dental Assisting, Industrial Maintenance Technology, Medical Assisting Technologies, Precision Machining/CNC Technology, Phlebotomy/EKG, Certified Nurse Aide and Welding Technology. Students also graduated from certificate programs: Construction & Welding Fundamentals, Customer & Office Support Technology, Gas Metal Arc Welding, and Nail Technician. Programs range from 96 to 1800 clock hours of training.

MACC graduates earn or soon will earn industry-recognized certifications including: Registered Phlebotomy Technician (RPT); Registered Medical Assistant (RMA); Registered Dental Assistant (RDA) and Dental Radiography; Ohio State Cosmetology and Barber Board Licensure; Certified Nurse Aide (CNA); American Welding Society (AWS); The National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER); OPAC certification in Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Outlook; NRF Customer Service & Sales; Nail Technician Licensure; and Basic Life Support (BLS) & HeartSaver First Aid. Career Development Program graduates also earn an ACT WorkKeys National Career Readiness Credential (NCRC).

MACC reported that it awarded \$123,671 in student scholarships made possible through grants received from local partner organizations and foundations. MACC also awarded over \$246,000 in state and federal grants to students to help cover student's training costs.

Students graduating from Career Development programs who successfully meet graduation requirements receive a Certificate of Completion and a Career Passport in addition to their industry credentials. To qualify, students must complete at least 90% of program scheduled hours and 100% of required coursework, achieve a 2.0 minimum grade point average, complete required externship, clinical or job shadow and complete Employability/Work Ethic Curriculum

MACC's 2025 overall completion rate was 87% with completers having 100% positive post-program placement, 71% working in a related field of their training; and 97% earning an industry credential.

MACC is accredited by the Accrediting Commission of Career Schools and Colleges and approved by the Ohio Department of Higher Education as an Ohio Technical Center providing post-secondary career technical education and a member of the Ohio Association of Career Technical and Adult Education.

Free tennis clinic offered to Clear Fork students

The Clear Fork Tennis program is offering free clinics to Colt students this summer.

Clear Fork Tennis coach Aaron Wilson recently conducted a free 4-day Tennis Clinic for Clear Fork students going into junior high or high school.

Wilson, a 1996 graduate of Clear Fork high school and 2025 MO-AC Coach of the Year, has a passion to get a racket into the hands of Clear Fork students.

"We are continuing clinics over the next few weeks," said Wilson. "Follow Clear Fork Tennis on Facebook or Instagram for times and dates for high school open courts. High school students can come anytime during the open court sessions."

"The middle school camp is more specific. It will be June 22-26, from noon to 2 pm. Rackets and water will be provided. Cancellations will be announced on Facebook and Instagram and questions can be directed to Techwilson20@gmail.com."

Wilson hopes to introduce the love of the game to students in "The Valley."

Wilson says, "The goal is to get kids to play tennis. Getting them to play for the team isn't my primary goal, but obviously if that happens, that's great!"

"I don't want to pull anybody from someone else's roster, but if somebody falls out of love with a sport, we would love for them to come play tennis. There's probably a lot of kids that have probably never played."

"As for getting kids involved, I thought, why not run some clinics? I started with the middle school students. I would do open courts with high school students, so the clinic got up and running."

Wilson also hoped for students to familiarize themselves with him and his program. "If their friends say something about tennis, they can say, 'I met the tennis coach, he's a nice guy, you got to go play.'"

"Since I don't teach in the district, it's hard to meet kids during the school day. I try to build a rapport."

"Many didn't know we had a tennis team, or where to go to play."

"The clinics are tailored for the beginner with no experience. If students don't have their own racquet or balls, we have them available to borrow during the clinic."

"The VFW in Bellville helped us with the equipment. I wrote a grant, they accepted it and gave me the money to buy 10 Wilson Blade rackets, which are the most used brands these days. Both the girls and the guys have used them almost every season. They are officially owned by the district."

"Before we got the grant, our kids would go to matches with two rackets — one was dad's racket from 1994 and the other was

Walmart or Target."

"If someone has their own racket, that's good also. If a racquet needs re-strung, I can help them with people who do that as well."

"I've had a couple parents come for sessions. If they want to work with their student, I'm good with that. However, during the matches, they would have to observe only, per OHSAA rules."
