Mansfield Fire Museum hosts national seminar

Mansfield's firefighting history is filled with stories of courage, tragedy and service — and earlier this week, those stories took center stage as fire museum curators from across North America gathered for a four-day celebration of preserving the history of the fire service.

From Aug. 16-19, fire museum curators and history enthusiasts from across the United States and Canada gathered in Mansfield for the 35th anniversary National Fire Museum Network Seminar, hosted by the Mansfield Fire Museum.

For Mansfield Fire Museum President Verne Bickers, bringing the milestone event to the city was both an honor and an opportunity.

"Not only are we honored to host the 35th anniversary, but we hope it will be the biggest one yet," Bickers said.

The National Fire Museum Network rotates its annual seminar among fire museums throughout

the country, giving those responsible for preserving fire-service history an opportunity to share ideas, learn from one another and explore new ways to care for the collections entrusted to them.

The Mid-Ohio Conference Center served as the primary location for presentations and programming, while the Mansfield Fire Museum provided meals and meeting space.

But the museum itself was much more than a backdrop for the gathering.

Its collection tells stories that stretch far beyond Mansfield, including artifacts that are rare — and in some cases one-of-a-kind.

Among them is one of only two retired original Smokey Bear suits. Once a Smokey Bear suit is retired, forestry service rules prohibit it from being worn again; otherwise, it must be destroyed.

The museum also houses a ladder truck containing the one-millionth Detroit diesel engine ever

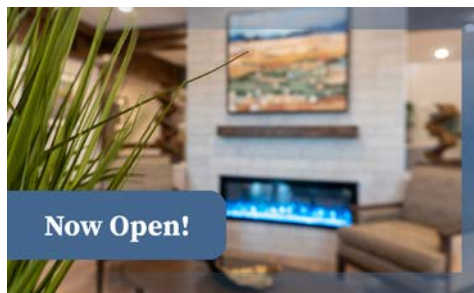

produced.

Another Mansfield fire truck carries a connection to one of the most tragic moments in aviation history. It was the first truck to arrive at the scene of the 1987 crash of Northwest Airlines Flight 255 in Detroit. Its captain rescued the crash's only survivor, a 4-year-old girl.

And then there are the pieces of Mansfield's own fire history.

The museum preserves the story of generations of firefighters who answered calls throughout the city—including those who battled the devastating February 1944 downtown fire that destroyed two landmark buildings on the Public Square and permanently altered Mansfield's Park Street skyline.

Those stories are part of the reason museums like Mansfield's matter. Fire museums don't simply preserve old trucks, uniforms and equipment. They preserve the people, emergencies and moments that shaped communities.

The seminar gave attendees an opportunity to see that mission firsthand.

Participants traveled to the Central Ohio Fire Museum in Columbus and the Ohio State Reformatory, experiencing two very different examples of historic preservation and museum operations.

At the reformatory, attendees had lunch in the prison commissary, where Jerry Miller, president of the North Central Ohio Industrial Museum, discussed the effort to establish the industrial museum and how its mission connects with the broader work of preserving history.

The seminar also brought several memorable moments to the Mansfield community.

On Sunday afternoon, Smokey Bear greeted participants outside the Mansfield Fire Museum with a "Welcome to Mansfield" sign.

Opening remarks followed Monday morning, when Mansfield Mayor Jody Perry and Fire Chief Dan Crow welcomed attendees at the Mid-Ohio Conference Center.

The seminar concluded Wednesday morning at the Ohio State Reformatory with a group photograph. Two ladder trucks were positioned in front of the historic prison with a large American flag suspended between them. Attendees also signed a banner that will eventually become a permanent exhibit at the Mansfield Fire Museum.

It was a fitting conclusion for a gathering centered on remembering.

For 35 years, the National Fire Museum Network Seminar has brought together people dedicated to making sure the history of the fire service is not lost. This year, that mission came to Mansfield—a city with its own deep firefighting history and a museum uniquely equipped to tell those stories.

For a few days in August, the stories preserved inside Mansfield's fire museum became part of a much larger national conversation about the importance of remembering where the fire service has been, the people who served, and the history that continues to shape the communities they protected.

Kathy Collins, Class of 1984, was named Team MVP in 1983 and 1984 for the Lady Rams Basketball Team.

In her career, she scored

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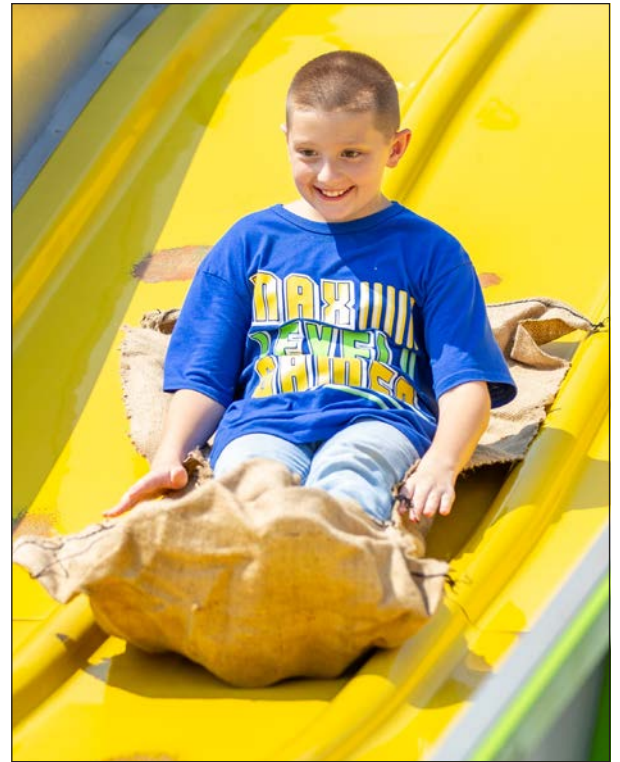


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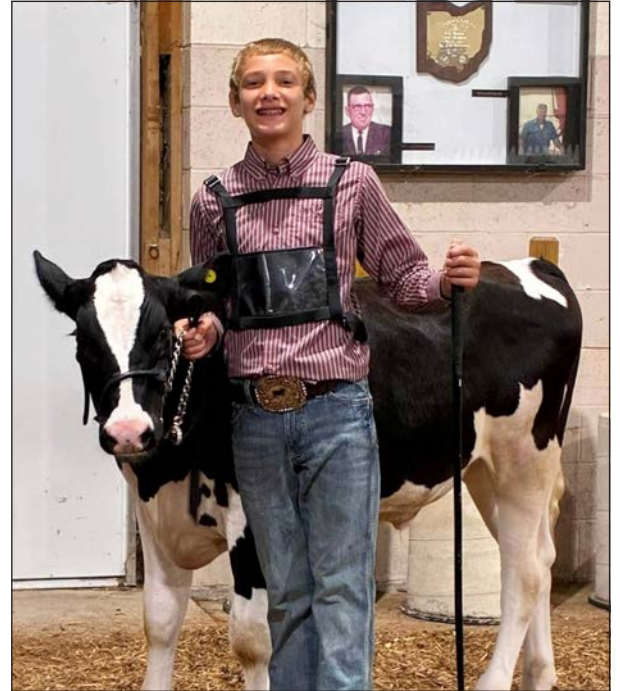


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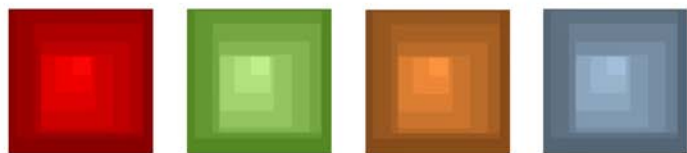

She played professional soccer at Bay FC. In her rookie season, she started all 26 matches and led all rookies in minutes played. She was one of only two rookies in the league to start every game. She recorded four goals and one assist, scored her first professional goal in August, and was named Rookie of the Month for October and November.

Jammi McClead, Class of 1996, was a three-year varsity letter winner, for cross country, a Captain Star recipient and a two-time All-Conference selection.

As a freshman, she was a regional qualifier and set the school record for freshman female runners, which was the 3rd fastest time in school history for a female.

She was a member of the 1992 OHC Championship Cross Country Team.

McClead was a three-year varsity letter winner and two-year team captain for soccer.

She was a three-time All-Conference selection and three-time Area All-Star Team selection. She won the Team Outstanding Defensive Player Award three times and, as a senior, was named Team MVP and won the Coaches' Award.

Her teams won two OHC Championships, two Sectional Championships and a District Championship and McClead was named the Mid-Ohio North/South All-Star Game MVP.

For basketball she was a three-year varsity letter winner and her teams won two OHC Championships, two Sectional Championships and a District Championship.

She was an All-Conference selection and set the school single game assist record.

In track and field she was a three-year varsity letter winner, two-time All-Conference selection and a two-time district qualifier.

She set school records in the 300m hurdles, the 800m run and she was also a member of the record setting 4x800m and 4x400m relay teams.

As a senior in softball she competed and lettered for the Lady Ram Softball Team.

She earned 2nd Team All-Conference, 1st

Team All-District and 1st Team News Journal All-Star recognition. She was also a member of the Sectional Championship team.

Joe Pearce, Class of 1963, set a football school record for 16 career interceptions.

During his senior year he averaged 10.1 yards per carry and set the school record for the longest touchdown run from scrimmage, scampering 98 yards. He was selected to play in the North-South All-Star Classic.

Pearce was a unanimous All-Conference selection on both offense and defense in 1961 and 1962. He was named Team MVP following both his junior and senior seasons.

Rob Peterson, Class of 1986, was a member of the 1986 Ohio Cardinal Conference Championship baseball team.

Following his senior season he was named All-Ohio, the Cardinal Conference Player of the Year and the Team MVP.

He played at the College of Wooster, where he was a three-year letter winner and was an all-conference selection as a sophomore and junior, a 1st Team All-Mideast Region selection as a junior, and played in the Division III College World Series as a junior.

Following his junior year he was selected by the Pittsburgh Pirates in the 1989 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. He played for two years in the Pittsburgh Pirates' minor league system.

He was Madison's head varsity baseball coach from 1992-'98, concluding his coaching career with an overall record of 110-52.

He coached the Rams to five Ohio Heartland Conference championships and a District Runner-up finish in 1998.

He was a member of the 1985 Ohio Cardinal Conference Championship basketball team and the 1986 Sectional Championship team.

Following his senior season he was named Team MVP, 1st Team All-Cardinal Conference, 1st Team AAA Northwest District 6 and All-Ohio Special Mention.

Peterson has spent his entire professional career in education serving Madison Local Schools. He has served Madison as a teacher, attendance officer, high school assistant principal, high school principal and superintendent.
